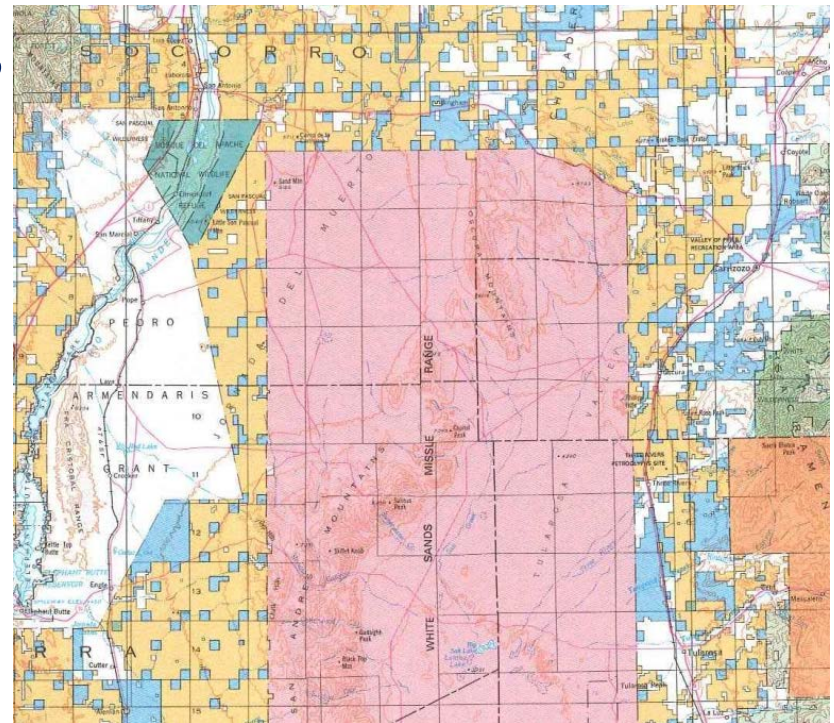

Land Use Planning

- Establish statutory standards
- Manage for Dominant uses
- Dispose of valuable lands
- Limit withdrawal authority



Environmental Policy

- Equal status for environmental quality
- State standards for environmental quality
- Minimize adverse environmental impacts
- Classify lands for differing degrees of environmental quality
- Create a natural areas system



Occupancy Uses

- Consolidate policies & classify lands
- Phase out residential/vacation homes
- Disposal where high value permanent facilities
- Make public land available for new cities
- Provide direct sale authority for national forest lands
- Sale of land to local governments
