### AN ACT

To organize the Militia.

Be it enacted by the Council and House of Representatives of Colorado Territory:

SECTION 1. Every able bodied male citizen of Colo- Who liable for rado between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except those who are by this act exempt therefrom, shall be subject and liable to perform military duty as a soldier, to uphold the constitution and laws of the United States and the Organic Act and laws of this Territory, according to the terms and provisions of this act.
