CHAPTER 234

#### PRISONS AND PRISONERS

PENITENTIARY—CONVICT LABOR AND GOODS

(Senate Bill No. 172. By Senator Gill)

### AN ACT

CONCERNING THE COLORADO STATE PENITENTIARY AND CONVICT LABOR.

Be It Enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

Sections Repealed Section 1. Sections 93 and 95, Chapter 131, 1935 Colorado Statutes Annotated, are hereby repealed.

Section Amended Section 2. Section 94, Chapter 131, 1935 Colorado Statutes Annotated, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Able-Bodied Prisoners Employed

Goods Sold to State

Surplus Goods May Be Sold on Open Market

Section 94. All able-bodied prisoners at the State Penitentiary shall be employed at such productive work as may be assigned to them by the warden of said institution. All goods, wares or merchandise manufactured, produced or mined, wholly or in part, by such prisoners shall be sold, to the extent possible, to the state and its institutions in accordance with the provisions of Sections 97 through 106, inclusive, Chapter 131, 1935 Colorado Statutes Annotated; provided, however, that any surplus of such goods, wares or merchandise which shall not be sold to the state or its institutions in such manner, may be sold on the open market in the State of Colorado at prevailing market prices. All moneys realized from the sale of any goods, wares or merchandise manufactured, produced or mined by such prisoners shall be used to defray the costs of operating the penitentiary and to satisfy the cost of maintenance and retention of prisoners

Section Amended

Section 3. Section 96, Chapter 131, 1935 Colorado Statutes Annotated, is hereby amended to read as follows:

at the penitentiary.

shall have full power, within the limits of the appropriations made to said institution for such purpose, to purchase property and Equipment including machinery, tools, supplies and materials as he may deem necessary to operate such types of industrial or agricultural projects within said institution to keep all able-bodied prisoners productively employed.

Section 4. All Acts or parts of Acts in conflict Repealing Clause herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. The General Assembly hereby finds, determines and declares that this Act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety.
