SCHOOLS II—STATE UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGES

AGRICULTURAL AND MECHANICAL COLLEGE— CHANGE OF NAME [CRS 124-10-48]

AN ACT

CHANGING THE NAME OF "THE COLORADO AGRICUL-TURAL AND MECHANICAL COLLEGE" TO THE "COLO-RADO STATE UNIVERSITY,"

Be It Enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

Section 1.—Name of college changed—The Agricultural College at Fort Collins, declared to be an institution of the state by section 5 of article VIII of the state constitution, and designated under the name and title of "The Colorado Agricultural and Mechanical College" by section 124-10-1, Colorado Revised Statutes 1953, shall hereafter be designated under the name and title of the "Colorado State University"; provided, however, that the legal effect of any statute heretofore designating such institution by any other name, or property rights heretofore acquired and obligations heretofore incurred under any other name, shall not be impaired hereby.

Section 2.—Safety Clause—The General Assembly hereby finds, determines and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety.

Section 3.—Effective date—This act shall be in force and effect from and after May 1, 1957.
