## RIGHTS OF MARRIED WOMEN

HOUSE BILL NO. 1333. BY REPRESENTATIVES Tempest, Dittmore, Arnold, Carroll, Eckelberry, Friedman, Gaon, Howe, Mullen, Sears, Showalter, Smith, Taylor, Webb, and Wells; also SENATORS Bermingham, G. Brown, Cisneros, Darby, McCormick, MacManus, Stockton, and Strickland.

## AN ACT

AMENDING 90-2-12, COLORADO REVISED STATUTES 1963, CONCERNING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF DOMICILE.

*Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

Section 1. 90-2-12, Colorado Revised Statutes 1963 (1969 Supp.), is amended to read:

**90-2-12. Domicile — sex or marriage not a ban.** The right of any citizen of the United States PERSON to become a resident domiciled in the state of Colorado shall not be denied or abridged because of sex or marital status, and the common law rule that the domicile of a married woman is that of her husband shall no longer be in effect in this state.

Section 2. **Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds, determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
