CHAPTER 310

GOVERNMENT — STATE

CLAIMS AGAINST STATE — CLAIMS COMMISSION

HOUSE BILL NO. 1588. BY REPRESENTATIVES Gorsuch and Tancredo; also SENATORS Allshouse, Anderson, Cole, Harding, Meiklejohn, and Smedley.

AN ACT

ABOLISHING THE COLORADO CLAIMS COMMISSION.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

Section 1. Part 7 of article 30 of title 24, Colorado Revised Statutes 1973, is amended BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION to read:

24-30-711. Consideration of claims. The Colorado claims commission shall not accept any claims for consideration filed on or after July 1, 1977; and the commission shall consider and dispose of all claims filed prior to July 1, 1977, on or before December 31, 1977.

Section 2. **Repeal — effective date.** (1) 24-1-116 (4) (b), part 7 of article 30 of title 24, and 28-2-111 (4), Colorado Revised Statutes 1973, are repealed effective January 1, 1978.

(2) 24-37-405 (1) (o), Colorado Revised Statutes 1973, as amended, is repealed effective January 1, 1978.

Section 3. **Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds, determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.

Capital letters indicate new material added to existing statutes; dashes through words indicate deletions from existing statutes and such material not part of act.
